Fall 2016 marks the beginning of the fifth year of the Middle East Studies initiative launched in 2012, and we have much to celebrate and look forward to. Our community is growing, and this will be yet another transformative year in terms of additional courses for our concentrators, expansion of ongoing research initiatives, and capacity for new and exciting programming. The Mellon Sawyer Postdoctoral Research Associate, Vikramaditya Thakur, is the point person. Two graduate students, Julia Gettle and Francesco Monar, will provide research and support.

It is my great pleasure to announce that Rachel Easterbrook will join the MES staff as administrative coordinator. Rachel holds a BA in History from the University of Pennsylvania and an MA in Middle East History from Florida State University. She has an extensive background in communications and media, and will help us consolidate our quickly growing program.
