INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS PROGRAM PRIZES (Class of 2015)

I. IR Thesis Prizes

Mark and Betty Garrison Prize (IR, \$500)

Awarded for the best thesis in international relations, foreign policy analysis, or diplomatic history.

This prize honors the work of Mark and Betty Garrison who helped create the Center for Foreign Policy Development (CFPD) at Brown University in 1981. This award was presented for the first time in 2002 and is the result of the generosity of former CFPD interns who were hired throughout the 1980s and 1990s to gain research experience, using data that resulted in publications, presentations, and other joint intellectual ventures with faculty. The former interns created a special pool of funds to support this prize, following the DFPD reunion in February 2002.

Samuel C. Lamport Prize (IR, \$1000)

Awarded for the best thesis on international understanding with an emphasis on cooperation and tolerance. First offered in 1943 by annual gift of the Trustees of the Samuel C. and Miriam D. Lamport Foundation, prizes are now awarded from the income of a fund donated to Brown University in 1952 by these trustees.

Anthony Riccio Prize in International Relations (\$300)

The Riccio Prize is awarded to that graduating senior who, in the grand spirit of the way that Tony Riccio lived his life, has demonstrated an unquenchable curiosity about another part of the world, a commitment to the rigorous learning of a foreign language, an intrepid pursuit of study abroad, and a pride in his university and in his country.

In memory of Anthony Brian Riccio, Brown Class of 1996, who lost his life in Moscow on September 20, 1994, this endowed prize was given for the first time in 1996 on the day that Tony Riccio would have received his degree from Brown. Donated by Meera Viswanathan, Professor of Comparative Literature and East Asian Studies, and Eric Widmer, formerly Dean of Admission at Brown.
