RESEARCH, CONFERENCES, AND PUBLICATIONS

NOVEMBER 2019 – PRESENT

Waiting and Punishment Research Assistant, BINGHAMTON UNIVERSITY

Worked under Dr. Joshua Price as we draw connections between waiting and punishment, especially in the context of our criminal justice system. Here we are exploring how waiting serves as a marker of difference and how certain populations in the United States and Jamaica are subject to wait for longer periods by the state, especially in the case of imprisonment. We are in the process of completing the paper, which we will submit to conferences and for publication.

AUGUST 2019 – PRESENT

Three County Opioid Epidemic Research Assistant, BINGHAMTON UNIVERSITY

Worked under Dr. Benita Roth to gather available data in three counties in Upstate New York to understand and qualify the current opioid epidemic. Utilized various research databases to garner relevant information, created detailed spreadsheets, and outlined commonalities found in the data. “The Primacy of Politics in a Pandemic: Social Movement Fields and Fighting the Opioid Epidemic in Central New York” was submitted and accepted for a roundtable at the American Sociological Association Conference in 2021.

NOVEMBER 2022

American Society of Criminology (2022), CONFERENCE

Accepted to present a co-authored paper entitled “Waiting, Social Control and Punishment.” We draw connections between waiting and punishment to explore the systemic power structures that regulate social interactions based on processes of stratification. Ultimately, we argue waiting serves as a marker of difference and certain groups are subject to wait for longer periods by the state.

AUGUST 2022

Accepted to present in a panel and a co-authored paper. The panel was on mutual aid and I discussed how women inside a local jail built solidarity and formed their own mutual aid projects during the COVID-19 pandemic. The co-authored paper, “The Primacy of Politics in a Pandemic: Social Movement Fields and Fighting the Opioid Epidemic in Central New York” explored the efficacy of varied political approaches in three counties to the opioid epidemic.

AUGUST 2021

American Sociological Association (2021), CONFERENCE

Accepted for a co-written conference paper entitled, “The Primacy of Politics in a Pandemic: Social Movement Fields and Fighting the Opioid Epidemic in Central New York.” The paper explored the question of why three counties in Central New York – Broome, Tioga, and Tompkins – have had different responses to the opioid epidemic. *Due to the COVID-19 pandemic we were unable to present, but we resubmitted and were accepted for the 2022 conference.

American Society of Criminology (2020), CONFERENCE

Two proposals were accepted for panel presentations at the American Society of Criminology conference of 2020. The first was a group paper entitled, “What is Prison Abolition Seeking to Abolish?” and the second was from my personal research entitled, “Time as a Weapon: A Study of Jail Life in Rural New York.” *Due to the COVID-19 pandemic the conference was cancelled.

Participated in panel discussions, workshops and events centered around incarceration and prison abolition.
